Linguistics is the scientific study of human languages. Linguistics majors complete rigorous coursework in language structure, acquisition, processing, and change. Graduates gain skills in research methods and data analysis that are applicable in a broad range of fields. Graduates also gain an in-depth understanding of the relationships between language, culture, and human perspectives. Linguistics students at UNM have the opportunity to study the science of language in a state with exceptional cultural and linguistic diversity. The Department of Linguistics offers a Bachelor of Arts in Linguistics and a minor in Navajo (Diné) Language.

Graduates often pursue careers in language education, translation, and specialized linguistics professions such as computational linguistics and lexicography. Some graduates pursue further education in Linguistics and related disciplines, while others choose to study and work in other areas, such as speech pathology and business.


