MAJORS

Critical cultural studies majors immerse students in interdisciplinary investigations of histories, communities, and human perspectives. These fields examine cultural phenomena such as political structures, social movements, and media with an emphasis on power, social organization, and the experiences of historically marginalized people. Several UNM departments offer majors that fall under this umbrella, each using a distinctive lens and operating within a rich scholarly tradition. 



Hands-on experience through jobs, internships and volunteer work will help you find focus in your field, plus building the skills and relationships that will allow a smooth transition to a job, graduate program or both.
- Ask your academic adviser, faculty adviser and professors about classes that include an internship or service learning component. For example, Women, Gender and Sexuality Studies offers a class called Feminism in Action in which students complete an internship in the community.
- Did you know that by serving in any <u>AmeriCorps program</u>, you can earn an education award to help pay for graduate school?
- Interested in working for the federal government? Special programs for <u>students</u> and <u>recent grads</u> are a great way to get started.
- Get an up-close up look at the field by conducting an <u>informational interview</u> with a professional who works in the field.
